A Word from Our Pastor

On September 30, 1982 a new primetime sitcom was introduced on the NBC fall lineup. Among 77 shows ranked for their premier, this one came in nearly last at #74. It was a humbling start for a show that eventually became part of NBC's "Must See TV" of the 1990s. This program ran for 11 seasons with 275 episodes that brought a new group of friends into our living rooms: Sam, Diane, Coach, Cliff and Norm to name just a few. It didn't matter if you'd never been to Boston or even patronized a bar; everyone knew *Cheers* by its defining characteristic: the place *where everybody knows your name*.

When we have guests in worship, people like Tom Shearer and Marilyn von Schlichten are usually the first friendly faces they see. I've observed how people take time to introduce themselves and get to know our guests. An important part of welcoming our guests is follow up; in fact, we request their contact information so we can say "Thank you for choosing to worship at Good Shepherd", invite them to share their first impressions and ask if they have any concerns we can lift in prayer for them. It's our opportunity to get to know our guest by name and show that we value his or her input. (By the way, I don't like the term *visitor*. Whether it's at home or church, a *guest* is someone who is made to feel welcome.) The majority of our Sunday guests say they've found people in our church to be very welcoming. As a testimony to that welcome, this month I'm hosting a New Member Class and have extended a personal invitation to 24 regularly worshipping guests! (They not only found a welcome, but have come back again and again.)

It makes all the difference when people are committed to extending a warm welcome and taking a genuine interest in others. Many churches *claim* to be friendly and welcoming, but that's not always what guests experience. On your first visit to a church, you may not feel comfortable stepping into a cluster of people or initiating a conversation. Most active church members report that they decided to come back after their first visit because someone took an

interest in them and made them feel welcomed; that speaks volumes of who we are as a church. Like that experience at *Cheers*, I hope our worship guests can tell others, *They're always glad you came!*

One small detail about Sunday worship is that we track worship attendance, not by a general count, but by name! That means your church is a place where you matter personally. When you are here, you're a valued member of a faith community, worshipping and praying, serving and playing; when you are not here, you are dearly missed. What a wonderful reminder that you matter to God and you matter as part of the community of faith that is Good Shepherd Lutheran Church. When we take time to extend that kind of welcome and demonstrate that level of care to

others, we show that our church is a place, like *Cheers*, *where everybody knows your name*.

That defining characteristic of our church brings Psalm 133:1 to mind. Allow me to paraphrase: *How good and pleasant it is when we all get along in harmony*. We worship together as one, but there are other opportunities where we build relationships in the church: dinners, special trips,

serving in leadership, and working side by side on projects like the food bank, lawn care, quilting, Operation Christmas Child, singing in worship, tending the gardens, and so much more! Beyond worship, where will you get to know others by name? And for that matter, how will you extend that kind of welcome to others you know and meet at church?

It's great to get together, right? *Taking a break from all your worries, sure would help a lot!* We don't come together just for the sake of coming together. Church isn't a commune or an escape from the world; on the contrary, church is a place where we discover that God knows us by name, where we find grace and forgiveness in Jesus Christ who gave his life for us and we are equipped to share that good news with others. We stand with others in worship, recognizing our need for God's grace-*You wanna be where you can see, our troubles are all the same*-But beyond the bless-



ing of gathering is the mission Jesus gave us: "Make Disciples!" A church *Where Everybody Knows Your Name* is great, but more than that, church is a place where Jesus Himself meets us in Word and Sacrament, equips us and sends us out of the church to share the Good News of forgiveness, life, hope and salvation for all people.

It's easy to welcome people who find our church - we do it every week. My earnest prayer is that each one of us sees our role as a valued member of God's Kingdom, personally sent to extend that welcome beyond the church so God's kingdom may grow and others may know His name!

Stewardship

When talking about Stewardship, the saying goes, “We should be good stewards of our time, talents, and treasures.” We have lots of good teachings on using our talents and our money.

So, in good Lutheran fashion, let's ask:

What does this mean to be a good steward of time?

Or maybe we should ask, “What **doesn't** this mean to be a good steward of time?”

- ✦ Being a good steward of time doesn't mean keeping track of every minute of our day, always being productive, or never wasting time.
- ✦ Neither does it mean that bosses (overseers in the catechism) should hold their workers to overly high standards.
- ✦ Nor does it have anything to do with meriting salvation or forgiveness of sins.

As sinners, when considering our use of time, we can easily get caught in a works righteousness mindset. We can create elaborate schedules, become prideful, judgmental, legalistic, or even despairing.

The Book of Ecclesiastes is our best Biblical resource when considering work and spending our time well.

I perceived there is nothing better for them than to be joyful and to do good as long as they live; also that everyone should eat and drink and take pleasure in all his toil - this is God's gift to man. Ecclesiastes 3:12-13

Note well! Work and enjoyment are both God's gifts to us.

Whatever your hand finds to do, do it with your might. Ecclesiastes 9:10a

Being a good steward of time is fairly simple: We should spend our time doing the work God puts before us to do, according to our station in life.

Regarding this topic, Luther adds:

“But one should travel on the royal road. Let us work hard and do whatever we can in accordance with the Word of God; let us not, however measure the work on the basis of our efforts, but commit every effort and plan and outcome to the wisdom of God.” AE 15:74-75

He further says to not be too negligent or too concerned about your work, but to leave it all in the hands of God.

And if you're still unsure how to spend those extra hours, enjoy God's gift of creation, of friendship and family, of His Word. We spend time well when we enjoy God's gifts to us.

ServingGenerously Fair - again!

On the Sundays August 31, September 7 & 14 the Stewardship, Fellowship and Outreach committees will once again be providing an opportunity to view and volunteer for the many ministries happening at Good Shepherd this upcoming fall and winter. Augsburg Confession Study

A study of the Augsburg Confession – one of the Lutheran confessional documents – will start in September.

Historical Context

Several years after Luther wrote the 95 theses, an assembly in Augsburg, Germany was planned by Emperor Charles V to settle the conflict between the Lutherans and the Roman Catholic Church.

In preparation, the Lutherans wrote the Augsburg Confession. Addressed to Charles V, the Augsburg Confession outlines how the Lutheran teachings and beliefs are based on God's Word.

Study Sessions

If you are interested in discussing the history of Lutheran teachings and their Scriptural basis, come **Mondays from 6:30pm-7:30pm starting September 15th** to read and discuss the Augsburg Confession along with its Scripture references.

Lot's wife, Delilah, Jezebel, the woman at the well – each exhibited behavior that, to put it mildly, would be considered unacceptable. Each week, we will discover how God reached out to one of them with mercy, compassion and love – just as He reaches out to us. All women are welcome. Please sign up in the narthex.

MULTI-AGE SUNDAY SCHOOL:

During the month of August, we have started using upper level learning material called Bible in Life. We connect with God's Word, study God's Word, interact with God's Word, and apply God's Word in each lesson.

1. "First Things First" taught us how to put God first based on the first commandment, "You shall have no other God's before me." A wealthy young man came to Jesus, but learned he couldn't enter the kingdom of God because he was unwilling to part with his wealth.
2. "A Day Set Apart" was about God giving us a special day to enjoy Him. This was based on the fourth commandment, "Remember the Sabbath day by keeping it holy". The Pharisees were trying to trick Jesus by pointing out things that shouldn't be done on the Sabbath. Jesus told them that the extra man-made rules for the Sabbath made it a burden instead of a special day.
3. "Misunderstood" taught us how to obey our parents even when it seems like they don't understand. This lesson was based on the fifth commandment, "Honor your father and mother". Jesus and his family were at the Passover festival. Jesus stayed behind and his parents misunderstood why he had to be there. As the Son of God and Son of Man, Jesus had to obey His Heavenly Father and His earthly parents.
4. "Rich and Foolish" was about learning to be happy with what you have based on the tenth commandment, "You shall not covet". A man asked Jesus to tell his brother to divide an inheritance with him. The man showed his desire to have what his brother had.

These rules to live by (The Ten Commandments) are still our guide for daily life. Living it "The Jesus Way".



Drinking from the Puddles

A book that I highly recommend is, *A Shepherd Looks at Psalm 23*, by Phillip Keller. Keller, the son of missionary parents, grew up in Kenya, and early in his adult life purchased sheep and embarked on the career as a shepherd. Later as a pastor himself, he wrote this book on the 23rd Psalm from the perspective of an actual shepherd, as well as a pastor. His background and insight as both are beautifully brought out in this book, which should enable anyone who reads it to have a better understanding and deeper appreciation for this beloved Psalm.

The line, "He leadeth me beside the still waters" reminds us of the necessity we all have for water. It is pointed out in Keller's book that the need for water is something that is common for all creatures. For sheep, the only remedy for obtaining a good source of fresh water comes about solely through the knowledge and effort of the shepherd. He is responsible for leading them to the 'still waters'.

This Shepherd's Psalm is of course an analogy, wherein we who have put our hope in 'the Shepherd of our souls' (1 Peter 2:25), find all of our needs satisfied when we are truly following the Good Shepherd. Apart from him, we are lost and helpless sheep, and will fall prey to the enemy. The imagery of 'thirst' is frequently used throughout Scripture, not only of our need for God's help, but also our longing for his salvation. The psalmist speaks with confidence that God alone is capable of quenching his spiritual thirst.

Keller also describes people that he knows who seek to satisfy this 'thirst' by pursuing everything BUT the Good Shepherd. He cites such things as the arts, culture, music, literature, travel, sports, hobbies, community efforts, drugs, alcohol, sexual adventure, and such - all of which cannot satisfy the 'thirsting soul' (Psalm 42). Such is the indictment given through the prophet Jeremiah(2:13): "For my people have committed two evils; they have forsaken me the fountain of living waters, and hewed them out cisterns, broken cisterns, that can hold no water"

In spite of the best efforts of the shepherd in leading his sheep to a clean source of water, there are those who would rather drink from the puddles. So it is true of the Good Shepherd seeking to lead us to the 'still waters'. Keller describes this as follows:

"Of course there is always a percentage of perverse people who will refuse to allow God to lead them. They insist on running their own lives and following the dictates of their own wills. They insist they can be masters of their own destinies even if ultimately such destinies are destructive. They don't want to be directed by the Spirit of God - they don't want to be led by Him - they want to walk in their own ways and drink from any old source that they fancy might satisfy their whims."

"They remind me very much of a bunch of sheep I watched one day which were being led down to a magnificent mountain stream. The snow-fed waters were flowing pure and clear and crystal clean between lovely banks of trees. But on the way several stubborn ewes and their lambs stopped, instead, to drink from small, dirty, muddy pools beside the trail. The

water was filthy and polluted not only with the churned up mud from the passing sheep but even with the manure and urine of previous flocks that had passed that way. Still these stubborn sheep were quite sure it was the best drink obtainable.”

“People often try this pursuit or that with the casual comment, ‘So, what? I can’t see that it’s going to do any harm!’ Little do they appreciate that often there is a delayed reaction and that considerable time may elapse before the full impact of their misjudgment strikes home. Then suddenly they are in deep trouble and wonder why.”

Children’s Sermon

During a recent children’s sermon, Pastor Brian was filling Jase Blechertas’ backpack full of things to worry and have anxiety about. He pointed out how it weighs us down. Jesus says, “I tell you, do not be anxious about your life, what you will eat; or about your body what you will wear. For life is more than food and the body more than clothes.” (Luke 12:22-23)
